This FOI request relates to the University's Confucius Institute, in particular to the roles at the Confucius Institute for which individuals are recruited in China (if I understand correctly, that is the Chinese language teachers, and the 'Chinese co-director').

- Are these University roles?
- 2. Are the rights and privileges of University Staff attached to these roles?
- 3. Are those who occupy these roles staff of the University?
- 4. Are these individuals employed by the University?

Please share any documentation that answers these questions or otherwise defines the legal status of these roles and those who occupy them.

Please state whether the University has received legal advice about the legal status of these roles and those who occupy them.

University's Response

In response to **questions 1 - 4** above, please be advised the individuals have affiliated member of staff status, but are not employed or paid by the University They have a University of Glasgow email address and can access its network and library.

5. Please state whether the University has received legal advice about the legal status of these roles and those who occupy them.

No legal advice has been received about the legal status of the roles and those who occupy them. Therefore, the University of Glasgow does not hold the information that you have requested and is not aware of any other public authority that could respond to your request. Section 17 of FOISA states that where public authorities receive requests for information that they do not hold, they must issue a notice advising that they do not hold the requested information.

The supply of documents under the terms of the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 does not give the applicant or whoever receives the information any right to re-use it in such a way that might infringe the Copyright, Designs and Patents Act 1988 (for example, by making multiple copies, publishing or otherwise distributing the information to other individuals and the public). The Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 (Consequential Modifications) Order 2004 ensured that Section 50 of the Copyright, Designs and Patents Act 1988 ("CDPA") applies to the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 ("FOISA").

Your right to seek a review

You will receive a full response to your request for review within 20 working days of its receipt.

If you are dissatisfied with the way in which we have handled your request for review you may ask the Scottish Information Commissioner to review our decision.
