

To whom it may concern

We've already got in touch with the network. However, they refused to cancel the speech and our communication was invalid. What's more, they have made arbitrary evaluations of our motherland based on the lack of evidence on the Internet and we are greatly offended. Besides, they accept the fact that the flag used to represent Xinjiang is a symbol of terrorism, but they still emphasize to us that it is an important representative of Xinjiang. As a result, we are concerned that this event might turn to be a campaign of terrorism.

In that case we would like to reiterate our main concern is their use of the East Turkistan flag in their propaganda. They said that it is necessary because this flag is very important to them, which makes us extremely dissatisfied. They think this flag is very important, which just shows the viciousness of their intentions. I think I can only draw one conclusion from what they said. They

are just a terrorist organization under the skin of democracy and justice. Let me tell you a story, one of our members in CSSA is from Kunming, Yunnan. This terrorism organization attacked the Train station there on 1- March 2014. She told us that her English teacher in middle school went to pick up his family from this train station. Just after 30 minutes he left, many terrorist organization members of this organization hacked and killed civilians with knives, resulting in the tragic death of nearly 30 innocent lives. This is just the tip of the iceberg of the crimes they have committed. Such an organization shamelessly claims to be misunderstood; I just want to ask what qualifications does such an organization have to show that they can represent the true aspirations of the people in Xinjiang? We believe that the University of Bristol SU, as an organization composed of many outstanding personnel, should have sufficient judgment and moral standards to conduct a fair evaluation.

SU needs to make the necessary investigations and decisions, rather than just let us communicate with them, because on the one hand it is related to its slander and disrespect for our motherland, and on the other hand, it is more related to the people's anti-terrorism and appeals. I think these are not only contrary to the purpose of SU, but also contrary to the basic ethics. If they are willing to draw a clear line with terrorism, we are happy to discuss with them. If they want to share the correct history and current situation of Xinjiang, we are even willing to help. As long as they do not remove the banner of causing great harm to the Chinese people, we will continue to protest against this anti-human speech, and we do not rule out through other means to prevent more people from being deceived by it.

Thank you for your email, and we are sorry for the loss of life of that student you have mentioned. We are not sure what kind of "unfair" and "biased" treatments your society member has witnessed and how the person believes that he/she could represent millions of people, including Han and Uygur, now living in Xinjiang province.

We are rather appalled to see the words that the East Turkistan flag is "important to the people there", as the organisation it represents is a group of separatists and terrorists. Here we have a story and also a fact to tell:

One of our members in CSSA is from Kunming, Yunnanprovince. On 3^a March 2014, a group of extremists from East Turkistan Islamic Movement attacked the train station in the city centre with long knives. She told us that her middle school English teacher went to pick up his family from this train station and the attack happened just after 30 minutes she left. On that day, a total of 29 people died and 143 were injured, and this is just one among many frenzy attacks they launched to the innocents throughout the past decade. People do have their rights to express their demands within reasons, but by doing so in such a violent way which costs so many innocent lives, they

were against justice and humanity and should never be forgiven. This disastrous terrorist attack was rarely reported by western media, but it did happen and is no different than those attacks in New York, London, and Paris. Whilst we are mourning for the dead, your members are saying that flag is important to the "people" there, and we seriously question who those "people" are.

We noticed that you tried to avoid triggering tension and anti-China mood in this event. Sadly, you failed to get the point that there is no flag that could represent Xinjiang as a separate state and using a terrorist's flag is a fatal mistake that would not comfort the Chinese students here, including us, yet will make them feel insulted even more.

We thank you for inviting us to attend your event, but we must refuse it. The use of terrorist flag has touched our principles and we rather want the SU to solve this matter than to settle it between ourselves. However, we would be open to discussion if that flag on the event profile is changed; and if you do so, we will be glad to attend to listen to your opinions and make our clarifications. Regards,

Dear CSSA,

Thank you very much for raising your concerns. Apologies for the delay in response, we had a recent student tragedy that has been difficult for those in the network.

The nature of the event on Monday is to have an open discussion on the situation in the region. But I'm very mindful that this is sensitive. There are deliberately no speakers from any high profile external organisations which have been criticised as furthering a sinophobic narrative. It will just be myself and another student - in fact I'm going to share some of the concerns you and other Chinese students have raised previously on this issue in the discussion.

The title states "oppressive" rather than "genocidal" which I hoped would capture the oppression faced there whilst not pandering to claims of "ethnic cleansing" or "genocide". I must reiterate that the situation there, while not necessarily to the extent sensationalised by the media, is distressing to many members of our network. The discussion on Monday aims to be a space where all can come together in solidarity to explore the issue. I hope this doesn't equate to "anti-China" or sinophobic content. I've noted a number of Chinese students are attending so I'll endeavour to ensure it's a safe space for them too. I'll also make sure I reshare our posts on sinophobia after the event too

With the flag specifically, other members of the network have stated previously how important the flag is to the people there and are highlighting that the associations being drawn are unfair and biased. This discussion aims to be a space to hear all the perspectives on it.

Would a member of the CSSA be interested in attending and speaking? We're happy to remarket with the concerns highlighted raised if so.

We have noticed that the Bristol SU BLACK, ASIAN AND MINORITY ETHINIC NETWORK(BAME) is organising a combination of informative talks and setting up campaigns. The campaigns falsely claim the existence of violence of institutional oppression against Uyghur Muslims in Xinjiang, China, and even widely use the flag of East Turkestan in the posters to represent so called Xinjiang-related issues.

Xinjiang is an inalienable part of the territory of China. The East Turkestan has been identified as a terrorist group by United Nations Security Council, United Kingdom, China and many other institutions. We are shocked by the flag of the East Turkestan, and have to express strong dissatisfaction and firm opposition to it.
